OFF-GRID WINTER CHECKLIST

1. Heating Essentials:

- Ensure your heating source (wood stove, propane heater, etc.) is in good working condition.
- Stock up on sufficient firewood or propane to last through the winter.

- For County Assistance with Firewood and/or Propane visit https://www.coconino.az.gov/149/Social-Services

2. Winterize Shelter:

- o Check for any drafts or leaks in your living space and seal them to conserve heat.
- o Insulate windows and doors to retain warmth.

3. Water Management:

- o Prevent freezing pipes by insulating them or using heat tape.
- Let outdoor water storage nozzles drip slightly to prevent freezing and busting.
- Have a plan for obtaining water if your regular source freezes, such as a well-insulated backup supply.

4. Emergency Power Supply:

- Ensure your off-grid power source (solar panels, wind turbine, generator) is winter-ready.
- Have a backup power source or generator in case of prolonged cloudy days.
- o Keep candles on-hand for Emergency light.

5. Winter Clothing and Gear:

- o Invest in proper winter clothing, including insulated boots, heavy-duty gloves, and thermal layers.
- Keep emergency supplies such as; blankets, flashlights, and non-perishable food in case of power outages.

6. Indoor Fire Prevention:

- o Clean the Chimney annually using a Chimney Sweep Brush.
- Make sure Space Heaters have an automatic tipping shut off and/or place them on a nonflammable surface such as ceramic tile. Remove all flammable items within 3 feet.

7. Food Storage:

- Check and stock your pantry with non-perishable food items for times when travel is challenging.

8. Outdoor Machinery Winterization:

 Drain gas or add fuel stabilizer (such as STA-BIL) check anti-freeze, disconnect the battery, keep equipment in a covered area or cover engine with a tarp.

9. Vehicle Readiness:

 Ensure your vehicle is winterized with appropriate tires, antifreeze, and emergency supplies such as a tow rope, blankets, water and snacks in case you get stuck.

10. Health Precautions:

- Have a basic first aid kit and necessary medications stocked.
- Stay informed about potential health risks associated with winter conditions at higher elevations.

Recipe of the Month

SOUTHWEST WHITE CHICKEN CHILI

Shared by the 2023 1st Place CCA Chili Cook-off Award winner, Anna Freese.



Ingredients

2 large chicken breasts cooked and chopped 2 cups chicken broth 15-ounce can of black beans rinsed and drained 15 ounce can of pinto beans 10 ounces of corn cooked and drained ½ teaspoon ground black pepper ½ teaspoon cumin ½ teaspoon chili powder ½ teaspoon dried minced onion or onion powder

1 cup chunky salsa ¼ cup heavy whipping cream not whipped

4 ounces cream cheese Philadephia brand, at room temperature, cubed

> 12 ounces of hatch chili queso ½ teaspoon salt optional or adjust to taste

Instructions

Pour the chicken broth, pepper, cumin, chili powder, dried minced onions, and cubed cream cheese into a large Dutch oven. Heat ingredients on low until cream cheese melts.

Whisk the mixture so it becomes creamy.

Add the cooked chicken, black beans, corn, salsa, and heavy cream. Stir to combine. Bring to a low boil then reduce heat to simmer. Simmer for 15 to 20 minutes with the lid on.

Taste and add salt if needed.

Add 12 ounces of hatch chili queso. Serve immediately.

Coconino County

COCONINO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS APPROVES YOUTH BEHAVIORAL HEALTH PROJECT

Coconino County Board of Supervisors has greenlit the Youth Behavioral Health Project (YBHP), funded by ARPA, aimed at providing preemptive behavioral healthcare for youth aged 12–18. The project includes an innovative youth behavioral resource center in Flagstaff and services in surrounding communities including Williams and Tusayan. Guided by the Allcove Model, it emphasizes a youth-led approach and offers various support services, fostering community engagement and partnerships tailored to each location. The goal is to collaborate with existing service providers to address pressing youth needs.

Coconino County Comprehensive Plan

This "Plan is the County's long-range policy document. It provides a twenty-year vision and guide for future physical, economic, and social development for the entire county, and contains maps, goals, policies, and implementation actions that guide decisions about the County's future, in particular land use decisions." Phase I was to create focus groups, one of which was held within Valle, which are designed to collect ideas for how the community and county should grow and what the needs, issues and trends were and how to address each of them. Next will be Phase II that will begin late Winter/ early Spring of 2024. This is when the plan will be drafted and made available for public review and comments prior to the public hearings. The early part of Phase II will include more focus groups, a survey, in-person community and online open houses, and the forming of a Comprehensive Plan Advisory Group.

Rural America

Roadmap for Rural Progress

The **Rural Action Policy Report**, praised by Sherri Jones from the Florence Unified School District, is a valuable tool for officials and service providers to understand rural Arizona. It addresses economic development, food supply, education, health, safety, and overall vitality. It emphasizes federal dollars are not only for big cities – but she says rural towns have a harder time making federal programs work. This initiative recommends 10% of federal program funding for lower-income counties, support for rural businesses and infrastructure, and strengthening the U.S. Postal Service. Jones stresses the need for tailored solutions, especially for unique challenges in tribal communities, aiming to diversify local economies and address economic declines in small towns. Jones added people feel the need to leave rural areas for better opportunities when they no longer see the value in staying. Jones added it is also important to acknowledge that all rural communities across Arizona are unique, and said tribal communities in particular face their own set of challenges, so there is no 'one-size-fits-all' approach.

There are 4 pillars that they would like to address:

PILLAR 3: Safeguard the power of workers, small businesses, and family farmers to build a good life; Limit Corporate Power | Accountability for Pollution | Food Labeling | Prescription Drugs | Empower Workers | Good Jobs

PILLAR 4: Ensure opportunities for a more secure, prosperous, and sustainable future; Natural Resources | Public Lands | Build a Renewable Energy Future














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
