

#### LET'S START PLANNING!

#### How to Make Gardeners Soap

#### **Materials**

1 tablespoon fresh coarse coffee/grounds

½ to ¾ pound goat milk melt and pour soap base (about 1½ cups or 8 cubes)

1 tablespoon cosmetic beeswax pellets

1 teaspoon olive, coconut, or almond oil

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

#### Tools

Silicone soap molds Measuring cup Measuring spoons

#### Instructions

- 1. Lay out the silicone mold and sprinkle a few coffee grounds into the bottom.
- 2. Cut up your goat's milk soap base into roughly 1"x1" pieces.
- 3. Place in a microwave-safe container with a spout for easy pouring.
- 4. Add oil and beeswax pellets.
- 5. Microwave for 1 minute, stir, then repeat in 30-second intervals until completely melted.
- 6. Remove from the microwave and stir in coffee and vanilla.
- 7. Carefully pour the soap mixture into your molds, not quite full to the top.
- 8. Allow soap to harden overnight.
- 9. Carefully remove from the mold.
- 10. Store your extra soaps in an airtight container in a cool, dry place.

## Recipe of the Month

#### **CORNED BEEF EGG ROLLS**



#### Ingredients

- 1½ cups shredded coleslaw mix
- 3 tablespoons water
- ¼ teaspoon kosher salt
- ¼ teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1/3 cup water
- 5 ounces cooked corned beef brisket
- 1 cup shredded Swiss cheese
- 8 egg roll wrappers
- 3 cups vegetable oil for frying, or as needed (Optional)

#### Dipping Sauce:

- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 3 tablespoons ketchup
- 3 tablespoons sweet pickle relish
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon smoked paprika
- ¼ teaspoon kosher salt

#### **Directions**

- 1. Stir together coleslaw, 3 tablespoons water, salt, and pepper in a medium microwave-safe bowl. Cover with a damp paper towel. Microwave until lightly steamed, about 1 minute and 30 seconds. Shred corned beef with hands or kitchen scissors, and add to coleslaw mixture along with Swiss cheese. Stir until evenly combined.
- 2. Fill a small bowl with remaining 1/3 cup water. Lay an egg roll wrapper on a clean work surface and top with about 1/3 cup of corned beef filling. Dip your finger into a bowl of water and wet the edges of the wrapper; tightly wrap, roll, and seal. Cover the egg roll with plastic wrap to prevent it from drying out and repeat this process with the remaining egg roll wrappers and filling.
- 3. Heat oil over medium-high in a deep fryer or large Dutch oven until a deep-fry thermometer inserted in oil registers 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).
- **4.** Working in batches, fry egg rolls until golden brown, 3 to 4 minutes, turning if necessary to ensure even browning. Allow oil to drip and cool on a paper towel-lined plate or sheet tray, for about 10 minutes.
- **5.** While egg rolls cool, prepare dipping sauce by mixing mayonnaise, ketchup, relish, lemon juice, paprika, and salt, in a bowl. Place cooled egg rolls on a plate and serve with sauce.

VALLE SEDIMENTS By Dana Eker

A warm welcoming March sun filters between bluish-gray clouds as sparkling snow melts into the vast Coconino Plateau, to be stored for rocky mountain pinon and one seeded junipers. Somedays. The hard fact is that now we have to navigate through the muck, spraying Moenkopi red brick mud from our vehicle's tires. Where the soil has absorbed too much of our precious resource the road washes out, tire wheels spin freely, freewheeling and fishtailing. Here and there the vehicle is slowed by broken remnants of Gray limestone laid down by ancient oceans.

Valle's floor is Permian in time, butted up to dark basalt lava flows on the south and east sides. Glancing eastward north of Flagstaff are low-lying cinder cones, or "knobs" according to Arizona Atlas, enveloping the latest wind farm in Coconino County. The "Knobs" are better seen when scaling the andesite flow under Hwy 180 towards Flagstaff. A look north towards Red Butte requires a pullover to get the awesomeness of space left after the "basin" surrounding the north and south rims drained into the tributaries of our famous ditch. Cataract Creek for one, drained ocean sediments that poured through older marine limestone, as seen on the edges of the rims. Any remaining sediments were transformed by geological forces of pressure and temperature, P and T. Thus creating deposits of sandstone, shale, dolomite, and gypsum. Not so exciting? Consider the jaspers, agates, drusy crystals, and geodes. My rough findings don't have much monetary value according to the rock people I've shown them to, but the curiosity is exciting.

One can find samples on the surface of our Toroweap Formation, once 200 feet thick, but the best specimens are nearer to 6 feet down requiring hammer, chisel, and muscle power. Who knew that Valle had such treasures underfoot?

# Coconino County

#### What is Uranium? Why do we need it? Is it safe?

Many questions and concerns are brought up with the mention of Uranium. This topic brings us s a complex combination of economic, environmental, and cultural concerns surrounding the mining near the Grand Canyon. Here are some key points and observations:

- **Economic Motivations**: The reopening of the Pinyon Plain mine reflects a broader trend of increasing demand for uranium as countries seek to transition to nuclear energy to reduce reliance on fossil fuels and mitigate climate change. This demand surge, particularly in the wake of international agreements like Cop28, has given companies like Energy Fuels Inc incentive to ramp up production.
- Environmental and Health Concerns: Opposition to the mine, particularly from Indigenous communities like the Havasupai Tribe and governmental bodies like the Coconino County Board of Supervisors, is primarily rooted in concerns over potential contamination of water sources and environmental degradation. The history of uranium mining in the region, including its adverse health effects on workers and local communities, underscores these concern.
- **Regulatory Oversight**: While Energy Fuels Inc. asserts that their operations meet regulatory standards and pose minimal risk to groundwater, skepticism persists among affected communities and environmental advocates. The issuance of an "aquifer protection permit" by the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ) indicates regulatory approval, but the efficacy of such permits in safeguarding against long-term environmental harm remains a subject of debate.
- **Cultural Preservation**: The opposition from the Havasupai Tribe is not solely based on environmental concerns but also encompasses the preservation of cultural heritage and ancestral lands. The designation of the area as a national monument by President Joe Biden underscores its cultural significance, further complicating the debate over resource extraction.
- Call for Transparency and Accountability: The resolution passed by the Coconino County Board of Supervisors reflects a demand for greater transparency, accountability, and adherence to modern environmental standards in the operation of the Pinyon Pine Mine. This includes robust monitoring of water and air quality, as well as a reevaluation of the mine's environmental impact statement to ensure compliance with current scientific knowledge. The board is calling for testing monthly and results being made publicly available.

Overall, the situation is a delicate balance between economic development, environmental preservation, and cultural heritage in resource-rich regions like the Grand Canyon. Resolving these tensions will require meaningful engagement with affected communities, rigorous regulatory oversight, and a commitment to sustainable resource management practices.
